

Theme Our hearts will sing in worship to him daily the whole of our life because he is rich in love, slow to anger, kind hearted and good. He established a covenant with us to be our holy God and never lets us down. We are in a series called "Covenant Living". Covenant is not a word that is as popular in our culture as it used to be. It still comes up in the context of weddings and marriages once in a

while -- but that is about it. So maybe it is good illustrate the word. And the easiest way for me to do that is to compare it to what is popular in our culture – the contract – which is sometimes written and sometimes oral.

In a simple contract, two parties agree that they will behave toward each other in a certain way. I go to a grocery store. They give me food, I give them money. Very simple, right? As long as both sides do their part –

the contract is maintained. But if either side doesn't do their side – if food is not provided, then I don't pay them money, or I get my money back, right? Or, if I take food, and don't pay, then I've broken my side of the contract and there are consequences when you break the contract, aren't there, especially on our side of it – I could get fined, have to reimburse, and maybe even go to jail.

A covenant enters into a commitment that strives to go beyond the simple conditional contract. The commitment to each other is not as easily broken just because someone fails to uphold their side of it. It is a commitment that goes beyond setbacks and failure. That is why traditional wedding vows do not only say, for better, for richer, for healthier, for just the good things – it also has the opposites because it includes a commitment that trusts that the relationship can endure in unfulfilled expectations, through difficult circumstances and beyond hidden challenges. Maybe this following story about a child who saw family as a contract while his mother saw family as a covenant may help us see the difference....

Once upon a time, there was a boy named Bradley. When he was about eight years old, he fell into the habit of thinking of everything in terms of money. If it cost a lot, it was worth a lot. If it didn't cost much, it wasn't worth anything. One morning Bradley came down to breakfast and put a little piece of neatly folded paper on his mother's plate. She opened it and it read:

Mother owes Bradley:

For running errands	3 dollars
For taking out the trash	2 dollars
For sweeping the floor	2 dollars
Extras	1 dollar

Total that mother owes Bradley 8 dollars Mother smiled but said nothing. When lunchtime came, she put the Bradley's neatly folded bill on his plate with 8 dollars tucked inside. Bradley opened it up and his eyes lit up when he saw the money and got excited and started dreaming about what he would buy as he stuffed the money into his pocket. Then as he started eating he noticed another piece of paper neatly folded beside his plate. He opened it up hoping to find a bonus – but instead this is what he read

Bradley stared at this bill without saying a word. After a few minutes, he pulled the 8 dollars and gave it back to his mother. [Now I've seen some posts where some kids would have said "bout time too" when they got the 9 dollars" but Bradley had enough sense in him that he realized he was in the wrong.] He realized that there are many things money cannot buy and some of them are the best things in the world. And after that, he helped his mother for love.

An unknown author poses a question that probes whether we are filling our side of our covenant with God, which could be summed as a motivation of loving God with all that we are -- and expressed by how we treat others. And this is "The Question"

Were the whole world good as you – not an atom better –

The covenant commitment that is supposed to be expressed in family and in marriage commitments is one of the better living illustrations of what a covenant is supposed to be, and so it is not surprising that our relationship with God is often compared to a family relationship – God as parent and we as the children – or,

God as groom in the Old Testament, or in the New Testament, Jesus as groom, and his people are the bride. Some background on wedding in those days so you know a little bit because we'll need to know it later. A wedding was [most often] a community wide celebration that lasted 5 to 7 days (not counting the honeymoon - they didn't have that - that was in the middle of this 5-7 days and they stayed local). It included the groom processing in grand fashion to the bride's home and then processing back to his parents' home where blessings are given – the bride and her bridesmaids (usually 10 of them) and friends retreat while the day continues with feasts and games and dancing. The next day the village is on holiday. Separate feasts are given for all the men and all the women. At some unknown time, the groom arrives and meets the bride. At that point all the men and women all join together and there is dialog between the couple and blessings are given by the religious leaders. There is a unified feast that night, and the party goes on for several more days... that is the minimal nutshell of it.... but most importantly for our context today – throughout this whole process is a friend of the groom who is the official messenger -- we'd call him the best man but with the role that is much more entailed than we have today. He stands by the groom and listens to him, is the intermediary between the couple because they are not allowed contact during this time – He is the one that makes sure everything and everyone is prepared and ready for when the groom arrives at an unknown time.

John the Baptist presents himself to his disciples as this "best man" for Jesus. He clearly understood his role at the wedding, that Jesus was the groom who was entering the covenant between Jesus and his people. John's disciples, however, were confused and concerned because they felt their rabbi, John the Baptist, was to be a competing groom for the exclusive loyalty for the same bride – the same people – and Jesus was winning. Let's read responsively.

Responsive Reading (L – Lay Reader, C: Pastor with Congregation)

L: John's disciples came to John and said, "Rabbi, you know the one who was with you on the other side of the Jordan, the one you authorized by your testimony?

C: Look, he is baptizing too, and everyone is going to him instead of us!"

L: John answered, "A man cannot receive a single thing, unless it has been given to him from heaven. You yourselves are witnesses that I said, 'I am not the Christ, but I have been sent ahead of him to get things ready.'

C: At a wedding, by definition, the groom is the one who gets married to the bride.

L: The friend of the bridegroom, his "best man" – that's me -- is just happy to be there. He stands by and listens for him, and stands in place at his side where he can hear every word –

C: and he is genuinely overjoyed when he hears the bridegroom's voice.

L: How can the best man be jealous when he knows the wedding is finished and the marriage is off to a good start?

C: That's why my cup is running over, and my joy is now complete.

L: This is the assigned moment for him to move to the center while I slip off to the sidelines. God's Son, the one who comes from above is far above all. Earthborn messengers are earthbound and speak in a way that belongs to earth.

C: The One who is heavenborn, who comes from heaven, is in a league of his own, superior to everyone.

Based on John 3:26-31 (blended from EHV, NIV, MSG, CEV)

Introduction to Bible Reading

It is easy to fall sometimes, to imagine that when things don't go well that repentance doesn't work, that God doesn't care about what is fair and right living, that living with integrity doesn't work in this culture, and to give up and even give in to the values of sinful living. This is what was happening in the days of Malachi. Under the pressures of difficult times, when their empty religious motions didn't work, they gave up on God, but God had a covenant message of his strength for those who dared to step out in faith.



Bible Reading

The Lord says, "You said cruel things to me." But you ask, "What did we say about you?" You said, "It is useless to worship God. We did what the Lord All-Powerful told us, but we didn't gain anything. We cried like people at a funeral to show we were sorry for our sins, but it didn't help. [Now] We think proud people are happy. Evil people succeed. They do evil things to test God's patience, and God does not punish them."

Then the Lord's followers spoke with each other, and the Lord listened to them... The Lord said, "They belong to me... Parents are very kind to their children who obey them. In the same way I will be kind to my followers. You people will come back to me, and you will learn the difference between good and evil. You will learn the difference between someone who follows God and someone who does not. Malachi 3:13-18 (ERV)

Sermon Covenant Living Care

Note: Translation of Isaiah 5:1-6,7b is by John D.W. Watts in the Word Biblical Commentary; 5:7a is NIRV.

Tuck that reading away for a little later. Let's first talk about John the Baptist – the "best man". One role we did not mention that this dear friend of the groom has -- is finalizing any negotiations between the two families, for it was not just about two

individuals romantically in love, but two families that were coming together for survival and benefit in a hard to live time. They came together to mutually support each other as extended families living in a harsh world, and the best man helped negotiate what that would look like. He also represented the groom if any issues arose with the bride to be.

This prepares us for Isaiah 5. The imagery begins with a man standing to address the gathered community. He draws them in with what sounds like a light musical toast to the marriage couple. Can you imagine yourself at the reception?

Now let me sing for my friend a song of my friend for his vineyard, a vineyard belonging to my friend in a very fruitful hill. (Isaiah 5:1)

We might wonder how the vineyard got in there. In poetry and music in those days, it wasn't unusual to describe a bride in those terms, NOT because she was "property", not that negative connotation; but as comparative to the traits of great value, and striking beauty, and nurture, and great promise... (See Song of Songs 4:12, 4:4, 7:4,8,9). The best man toasts that this is how this groom – (with his rose-colored glasses on – aren't most grooms?) it is how he saw her. And this vineyard is equated to the promised land of Canaan flowing with milk and honey.

He proceeded to **dig it**, then to **clear it** (of stones) then to **plant it** (with) choice vines. Then to **build a watch-tower** in it and even **a winepress** he hewed out in it, (Isaiah 5:2a **emphasis added**)

The best man's song moves fully into the vineyard image. He sings that the groom dug the ground, meaning a most thorough working of the field, breaking the hard ground necessary to receive young and tender plants. He removed all the stones that would prevent growth, and used them to create walls around the field, protecting it from sheep and other grazing animals. Then he planted the highest quality vines. On top of that, he built (rather than the ordinary shelter) the better, taller stone tower with thatched palm branches for the roof to better watch over the rich field. And not only that, he carved out an on-site winepress as well. In other words, no expense saved, no labor spared, no corners cut. This was a top-notch, highest quality of lavishing care and investment of energy. Got it? Now we are talking about a bride.

He waited for it to produce grapes, (Isaiah 5:2b emphasis added)

Have you ever noticed how in the Bible when they say wait, how much activity is going on? All of this diligent cultivating, weeding, irrigating, washing and pruning
