Special Music Seasonal Singers

The seasonal singers are going to sing one of the oldest Christmas Carols, being traced back to the 1500s, but not appearing in print until 1760, and the current melody was first in print in 1829. It was originally called "Tidings of Comfort and Joy". In those years church music was dark and somber, so the faithful took to the streets with more uplifting songs such as this. Charles Dicken's referenced it in his classic story a Christmas Carol, saying "...at the first sound of "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen", Scrooge grabbed his ruler with such energy of action that the singer fled in terror..." The carol is so ancient, it has been gone through many changes,

and many verses -- yet some of it has endured even though its vocabulary has not. Take the first phrase – God rest ye merry gentlemen – rest doesn't mean relax, or be at peace – it means keep or continue, merry doesn't mean jovial, it means strong or great, gentlemen aren't males with manners, they are the people born below the born or in position of nobility. So God rest you merry gentlemen basically means May God keep you (of lower social stature) strong, for Christ's birth (and mission) transcends anything that causes dismay. Intro to and Bible Reading 2

This is the beginning of the story of how heavenly grace filled the earth. In their culture, those who were engaged were bound together as husband and wife, but without marital relations. That bond could only be broken by a divorce. A women alleged to have been promiscuous prior to marriage was to be stoned, along with the man who was with her. (See Deuteronomy 22:23ff) Our reading describes Joseph as faithful to the Law, but also implies a deep love for his Mary. Joseph faces a dilemma of Law versus grace until God intervenes.



This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about. His mother Mary and Joseph had promised to get married. But before they started to live together, it became clear that she was going to have a baby. She became pregnant by the power of the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph was faithful to the law. But he did not want to put her to shame in public. So he planned to divorce her quietly.

But as Joseph was thinking about this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream. The angel said, "Joseph, son of David, don't be afraid to take Mary home as your wife. The baby inside her is from the Holy Spirit. She is going to have a son. You must give him the name Jesus. That's because he will save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:18-21 (NIRV)

Sermonette (Intro to) Standing on the Promises of Christmas

Once, I plugged external computer speakers into my computer, which was fine. But then I had grabbed the wrong power cable to plug it into the wall socket, (with the wrong transforming adapter on it). They didn't reduce the power flow from the wall to the speakers as they should, and the speakers were fried and fit for the garbage.

In the Old Testament, the common thought was that if you got to close to God, the overwhelming power that flowed from him would destroy you on the spot. Therefore, most people were terrified even when an angel in human form appeared on the scene. They set up boundaries around Mt Siani that only certain selected people that God has chosen could cross without dying.

A secular song asks, "If God had a face what would it look like? And would you want to see -- the ancient people in the Old Testament would say a definite "No thank you!" Even the afterglow of Moses' face when he had been in God's presence, they wanted covered up so they wouldn't have to look at that. The song goes on Would you want to see [God's face] if seeing meant that you would have to believe in things like heaven and Jesus and the saints and all the prophets?" ("One of Us" by Eric Bazillian)

The second question probably isn't difficult for most of us sitting in this building, or tuning it at home (or reading this script). It is because we want to see and believe that many of us come to this place or tune in at home on Sunday mornings. Though if we are really honest with ourselves, there may be times even this question might be a bit challenging to us -- if truly believing means we might have to exchange some of the things we like to do all of better things that God would have us do.

The first question – "what would his face look like?", we'd probably answer with the face of Jesus – though beyond general natural characteristics of a 1st century Palestinian Jew, we don't *really* know exactly what that looks like either – but we have seen so many paintings and drawings and actors made up to portray him through the centuries that images do come to our mind.

But if we don't take the word too literally, as we shouldn't when we read passages like "seek his face always" (1 Chronicles 16:11, Psalm 27:8, 105:4). The biblical phrase is meant — not to see a physical face — but to get focused on his presence and to know that he is with us. It is meant to learn more who God is and what he is like. It is not so much about the physical traits Jesus, but it is the life lived by Jesus that we need to know. This is what Christmas is about — God revealing himself to the world so that we get a good view — a good understanding of who he is and what values he cherishes, and what character traits we should emulate. Our reading tells us the beginning of God's ultimate steps to help us understand what it means to be faithful, to be God's child, to be fully human,, even — it begins in the birth of Jesus, and culminates in his death resurrection ascension and sending of the Holy Spirit. Paul explains it this way: "Now Christ is the visible expression [the image], [the exact likeness] of the invisible God (Colossians 1:15 (PHILLIPS)).

If you want to know what God is like, look at Jesus. If you know what humanity is supposed to look like, look at Jesus. Fully human, fully God. It is in Christ that we are able to approach without getting fried, like they feared at Siani, and like my computer speakers. It is in Christ's transforming grace that adapts us to him so that we can connect with God without being destroyed. And God accomplished all of this in him because of his great love for us. He loved the world so much that he sent Jesus to a manger so that he could plug into our world, and in a sense, you could say, he got "fried" so we didn't have to. Then, by his transforming power, he adapts us and fits us into what our heavenly Father God wants us to be so that we can work, live, play, and speak – with God's grace and love within us to our very full capacity. Jesus' coming to a manger is a visible promise upon whom we can securely stand in God's grace as his children.

In a secular television show, the mayor of a small town was stressed out, which caused him to sleepwalk, which caused him to be exhausted, which caused him to fall asleep while driving which landed him in the hospital, just slightly banged up. The news spread, but people didn't know that last detail, how serious (or not) it was. His wife got to the hospital room first and they began to talk.... He said as he was having the accident that his life flashed before him and "I remembered all these ... special moments and they were all here ... with people that I love ... I've been trying so hard to change this town to make it perfect, and it already is, at least to me, and I don't want it to change. I'm just so tired of trying to get everyone to like me."

She protested, "Oh, honey, everybody loves you."

"No, they don't. I'm just a mayor to them, [but] I know that you do, and that's what matters."

"I do." she agreed.

Meanwhile in a parallel plotline, two people were working to free their children who were abducted and being held in a highly secured facility. They were almost free when one of them lost their life protecting their adult son from a gunshot. But the other escaped with both of those children, one adult child and his own baby. Now with music in the background, the camera silently cuts across many scenes - from their return journey to the town where the mayor was hospitalized, and only enough spurts of dialog here and there so we know that all the main characters of the show were getting the news of the mayor's accident and were moving to go

there. While all these scenes are going on, the surviving father gives a voiceover on all this actions that are taking place:

The [father who died] was committed to finding his child, but it wasn't just commitment that made him willing to die for it. There was love too. The word commitment becomes something different when you add love to it. Humans call it devotion. This feeling of devotion is not just for families. If there is enough love, anybody will feel it. I was surprised by the feeling of love I had when I saw my baby... why does love surprise humans? Love is like air -- even if you cannot see it you have to know it is there.

(Resident Alien, "Best of Enemies" S2:Ep 15)

He said this as they show a steady stream of townspeople entering the hospital to see the mayor. I guess the mayor's assessment of how at least some people felt about him was wrong. Sometimes we need that visible expression.

On the one hand, love is like air – Peter said, we've seen him, but you haven't seen him, yet you love him, and believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy. (1 Peter 1:8) Christmas is about us putting a face on God – not a physical one – but knowing that love is in the air, and in us, because Jesus helps us clearly see God's true character -- what we could not have otherwise seen.

Music So let's go back to the see him through song – the beginnings of God's self-revelation in Jesus Christ. As you recall, the angels were singing to the shepherds about their promised hope who was lying in a manger and if we jump to another plot line, we also hear the Wise Men heard the message through a star -- we'll hear more about that later, but we want to get them into the story now...
