

# Intro to and Bible Reading 2

As the new Christian year begins, we start anticipating the birth of Christ. The front of the bulletin quotes the foreign prophet Balaam who anticipated that day in

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the far distant future -- much to the frustration of the leaders of his own people. For those at home, it says: "I see him coming, but not now, I see him coming, but not

soon. A star will [rise] from the family of Jacob. A new ruler will come from the Israelites." Matthew saw the birth of Jesus as a fulfillment of the prophet Micah's continuing anticipation of the glorious king that would rise over his people and bring peace to the world. While Matthew needs to only grab a short quote to put in the minds of his readers the whole thought of Micah, we will insert. at that point a longer excerpt from the prophet...



After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." When King Herod heard this he was disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him. When he had called together all the people's chief priests and teachers of the law, he asked them where the Messiah was to be born. "In Bethlehem in Judea," they replied, "for this is what the prophet has written: Matthew 2:1-5 (NIV)

But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, are the smallest town in Judah. Your family is almost too small to count, but the "Ruler of Israel" will come from you to rule for me. His beginnings are from ancient times, from long, long ago. The Lord will let his people be defeated until the woman gives birth to her child, the promised king. Then the rest of his brothers will come back to join the people of Israel. He will begin to rule Israel in the power of the LORD. Like a shepherd, he will lead his people in the wonderful name of the LORD his God. And they will live in safety because then his greatness will be known all over the world. He will bring a time of peace.

Then Herod called the Magi secretly and found out from them the exact time the star had appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search carefully for the child. As soon as you find him, report to me, so that I too may go and worship him." After they had heard the king, they went on their way, and the star they had seen when it rose went ahead of them until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they

#### The Arrival: The Signs of Christmas Sermon

The magi usually arrive on the 12th day of Christmas, which is Ephiphany, January 6. But their "late arrival in the story" may have, more than anything else, had more to do with the distance they had to travel. So for this year, for a change, we'll see if they can teach us something different than they do on Epiphany by letting them start us off on our Christmas journey this year. This is the first day of Advent which I sometimes use as an acrostic to say: Advent is: Anticipating Divine Visitation Expecting New Things).

Obviously, the Magi were searching the skies (or they wouldn't have seen anything). What was the purpose of their quest? Was it a cry for help in difficult times? Were they desperate for something new in their nation? Was it simply a normal discipline of their religious or other experience? Or was it something they

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weren't even looking for, but once they saw it, they couldn't "unsee" it. One thing we do learn from them is that God is so filled with love for people that he will accommodate himself to the people he is trying to reach – he will communicate with signs in a way that --- if they are willing to look and listen, they will be able to understand what God is trying to communicate with them. He doesn't talk "over our heads."

But sometimes we look for signs in the wrong places, and that makes it hard for us to see them. I was born and raised in Michigan. On major intersections, where do we look for the traffic light? [up and in front]. Exactly. When I went to seminary, in Kansas City, that is not where they were. They on the corner where your walk signs, and stop signs are. I had to relearn how to find my way safely through the roads because of their different way of placing directions to drivers. They also have a different way of merging and unmerging from highways, but that is a different story. (i) If you are driving in the right lane on the highway, almost without warning you will find yourself exiting the highway unless you move a lane left. They do that a little up here, (but with much more advance warning); but not near as often as down there.

Today's text helps us know where and how to look to see what God is wanting to tell us. The wise men saw his star rise and came to worship.

Whatever expertise they had, they knew how to understand and apply what they saw. We may or may not get such a direct message from nature – yet it is clear that if we look at creation through spiritual eyes, God can use it to speak to us and teach us – and actually he can use everything around us, not just nature. But the Psalmist wrote:

The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they reveal knowledge. They have no speech, they use no words; no sound is heard from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world. Psalm 19:1-4 (NIV)

In my college days I remember going out on walks at night seeking – because I was in an extremely receptive stage of my life, seeking and expecting. God used things, often common things around me, to teach spiritual truths. When such truths are verified (as best I could verify them), the point isn't just to learn them, but to act on such learnings. The wise ones were so sure of God's sign to them that they left home and traveled many, many, many, many, many miles – just to see what

God was doing, because they understood that there was a king (foreign to them) that would have a huge impact not only among that king's own people, but among all the nations of the world.

The danger for us, of course, is that it is not always easy to accurately hear God's proclamations through things that don't speak with actual words, or trust (the right understanding) of the words of people who do use them. That is why I said that what we learn needs to be verified.

The next thing they did when they got close to where the star was leading them, was to ask questions of anyone and everyone who might have heard about what they were seeking. The question reached Herod, who is not the best example, for sure – paranoid as he was – but his position also gave him access to experts who were able to give information that would get the wise men closer yet. We too, should consult mature Christians for their wisdom in the Christian life. But even they are human, so ultimately, we must consult the life of Jesus in Scripture. Someone once suggested that we read one chapter of Luke each day (beginning Dec 1). This is only the third, so we could easily catch up if we wanted to do that. The book concludes after 24 chapters, so on Christmas Eve participants will have experienced the birth, life, teachings and actions of Jesus, including his death, resurrection and final instructions -- reminding us why we celebrate this season, and maybe too, each participant may also discover some signs to follow in their own lives - some changes in life that are needed to follow him more closely, which leads to our last and most important sign of Christmas -- the wise men, loaded with more information, continued to follow the star until they reached the house where Mary and Jesus were staying. They bowed (they were humble). They worshiped, and gifted him with their treasures.

Ultimately, God's sign, God's message to us is Jesus himself. As the angels told the shepherds that the baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger *would be the sign* to them that a Savior, the Messiah, is born for them; (See Luke 2:11-12) It is not enough for us, just as it was not enough for the wise ones, to grasp a sign as a sign and know what it means, to study all about it and know all the ins and outs of the sign – they had to do more than that, they had to experience Jesus personally.

That is what we need to do too – it is not enough to just know all the facts about everything, those facts have to mean something. We too need to experience God's risen Jesus and Spirit within our own hearts, and not only to know him as a person, but to allow him complete guidance in our lives. Just as the star guided the wise

men to the manger to bow and worship and give gifts and a token of their devotion, so we need to allow our relationship with Jesus to guide us to live and worship and give and serve as our sign of devotion to him.

The physical signs of the coming of Christmas become more prominent each week as we walk into stores, and hear the music, we see the street decorations going up, and how some transform homes and yards into beacons of, not to mention the purchase of gifts and sending of cards and preparations for family reunions. Celebrating the season of Christmas through such signs are a good thing. But this season, let those things also point us beyond just what we are doping, and to our God and help us to prepare us to look and listen for what he wants to give us as he comes to be born in us again this year. What might that mean for our lives today? Are we living in a way that we might become a sign of his love for others?

As we heard during the candles, the focus of Advent's start is hope. Hope is something that moves us into the future. Sometimes when I look through social media, I get the feeling that many people are really hoping they were living 50 years ago. Nothing wrong with reminiscing and enjoying memories and that kind of thing, but sometimes it seems like people are saying "we need to go back there." And the foundation of our hope may come from the past, (such as Christmas and Easter) but the direction of our hope must always be pointing forward.

I think I told you once, of the children's story, Johnny the Lizard. I'll just summarize it very quickly. An unusual trait of some lizards is that in crisis, life and death kind of crisis, they will lose their tails, and the muscles in those tails will continue to wiggle and bob, and the predator will see the tail jumping about over here while the lizard is over there, and it is distracted, hopefully allowing the lizard to get away. Johnny was that type of lizard in our story. He had an extreme crisis. Actually, what he did was that he went out sunning, and he fell asleep. Some mean kids came along. They grabbed him and played with him, and they were holding him by the tail. Johnny separated from his tail and ran away, and he could hear the kids laughing as he ran because the tail was still flipping around in their hand. They had fun with it for a while, but then discarded somewhere along the way. Well, Johnny missed his tail, so he started to hunt for it. (like the wise men hunting for the star). He looked all over for it. Also, like the wise men, he asked anyone he could find if they had seen that tail. He searched for months, looking for information, until finally one observant expert asked, "Why do you want two tails?" Johnny was confused

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until he turned around to see he had grown a new tail. As luck would have it, -- you know the saying -- as soon as you stop looking for something, you find it – well, on his way home from that encounter he found his old tail. He picked it up and carried it with him until a frog pointed out how icky it was, and then he discarded it. As he continued home, he realized how much time he had wasted trying to recapture something that was an important part of him --- in the past --- and that he loved so much, but what he really needed was to drop the old longings and move into a new day.

It was hope that drew the Magi from their far away homes, hope that forced them to research and ask all kinds of questions, hope that brought them to the young Jesus, hope that put them on their knees and present gifts to this new king, it was hope that caused them to believe in his worldwide influence. It was hope in this new future that brought them on their spiritual quest.

The Psalmist prays for help and signs to show and guide his ways – asking where he should look – and then answers his own question by saying that he looks to the Lord because he trusts and puts his hope in God, his salvation. Based on a couple Psalms that had these kind of themes, Aaron Shust composed these lyrics (and I paraphrased them a bit to shorten it up): I meet with you, (with God) he says. My soul sings out for your Word throws doubt far away, My heart cries out that you are near! I wait for you and my soul finds rest. When selfish -- you show me grace. You are my refuge. I won't be shaken by troubles for you give me a peace that passes understanding – for my hope is in you all the day long.

I saw an illustration of a manger once, the caption read: Children Need a Stable Background. Christmas hope is "stable-ized" and grounded on the foundation that God is with us and loves us...and in whom we receive unconditional love and find our identity as we strive to follow his light into our future.

# Communion

**Invitation** And what better way to renew our hope than through Communion. You don't need to be a member. Our table is open to all who want their identity to be found in Christ, to receive (or receive again) His unlimited, unconditional love as we strive to follow his light in worship and in life.

**Affirmation: The Apostle's Creed** Let's prepare our *minds* with an Affirmation of what we believe as expressed in the Apostle's Creed.

Do you believe in God the Father?

#### I believe in God, the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ?

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of the Father, and will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy universal church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.
