Theme

Intro to and Bible Reading 2

We will look at the story of Esther. Her actions led to the festival of Purim, one of the most joyful of the Jewish festivals. It celebrates the redemption of the Jewish people in the land of Susa. We'll hear the fuller story later, but we will reinforce critical events of the story now. Mordecai overheard a plot to assassinate the king. He sent word to his cousin Queen Esther, who told king Xerxes, who thwarted the plot, and this was recorded in historical annals.

Then the king began honoring and elevating Haman over all the other government officials. Orders were that the king's



servants were to bow before him. This went to Haman's head. Mordecai refused to do this, and it bothered Haman to no end. He not only wanted to destroy Mordecai, but all his people, the Jews, who lived in all the kingdom of Xerxes.

Mordecai reached out to Queen Esther to intercede. But anyone approaching the king in the inner courtyard when he hasn't summoned you (and he hadn't

summoned her for a month), is a death sentence --- unless the king chooses to intervene. Through a messenger, she explained this to Mordecai. She was afraid for her life. Summary of 2:22-3:6, 4:8-11

Upon being told what Esther had said, Mordecai asked them to give Esther this answer: "Don't suppose that merely because you happen to be in the royal palace you will escape any more than the other Jews. For if you fail to speak up now, relief and deliverance will come to the Jews from a different direction; but you and your father's family will perish. Who knows whether you didn't come into your royal position precisely for such a time as this." Esther had them return this answer to Mordecai: "Go, assemble all the Jews to be found in Susa, and have them fast for me, neither eating nor drinking for three days, night and day; also I and the girls attending me will fast the same way. Then I will go in to the king, which is against the law; and if I perish, I perish." Then Mordecai went his way and did everything Esther had ordered him to do.

Sermon Where is the Love?

There is a passage in the Bible that talks about many great qualities we are to have as Christians; and then how we are to put on love which binds all of these qualities together in perfect unity (See Colossians 3:12-14), and then the love chapter introduces the topic by telling us that we can speak wonderfully, know everything, do great miracles, give all we have, sacrifice our very bodies – if we do all this – but there is no love in it, it doesn't benefit anyone or anything. (See 1 Corinthians 13:1-3) So it is not surprising that E Stanley Jones' concludes with this 15th enemy of abundant living: the absence of a positive, outgoing, love. If we can conquer the first fourteen major enemies to abundant living, but lack outgoing love, we will come up short in our quest.

Josh McDowell wrote a book called "Givers, Takers, and Other Kinds of Lovers." Let's illustrate its basic concept this way: Imagine we are all in the same boat, which is taking on water.

A giver lover is one who will pick up the pail and bail the water and refuse to let anyone else help. They want to do the sacrifice and salvation all by themselves. It sounds noble, but this giver wears him or herself out, and they deny others the gift of helping, of taking responsibility and sharing in the community task of keeping the boat afloat.

A taker lover is one who sits in the boat and receives, sometimes even demanding others do all the bailing for them. While they may think and say they want to help the sinking ship, they really are not in the boat to help, but to only receive the benefits of others' work. They expect love from others, but they expect nothing of themselves in giving love back. They love to help others practice their gifts so that they don't have to take part themselves.

The other kinds of lovers recognize mutuality. They recognize that we are all in the boat together and all have our roles to play, and all should do whatever they can to help everyone participate to the best of their abilities because that is how all of us will excel the most. This mutual love is the kind that sacrifices all and at the same time can accomplish anything. Jones explains that you cannot get rid of your own troubles unless you take on the troubles of others. We bring out the best of ourselves and others not by doing it for or demanding it from others, but by an infectious mutual outgoing love.

The truth is we are infectious. The question is – what kind of infection are we bringing? An infection that drags us and others down because we are doing it all or demanding it all? Or an infection that helps awaken ourselves and others to live up to our full group potential. Jones quotes Leslie Salter saying, "very normal man or woman longs for love, for warm friendship, for admiration and human responsiveness from others more than for anything else in life.... If we want to live fully, then we must invest ourselves in others, encouraging, cheering, supporting; and you may receive in return a friendliness and happiness you never dreamed possible, and which will revolutionize your whole life."

We may discover, that loving our enemies because we first love God because he first loved us is better medical treatment not only for our nervous indigestion but also for almost anything that ails us. Where in the Bible do we look for examples outgoing love? You can pretty much just let it fall open because it is saturated throughout the sacred pages as it describes people in all kinds of circumstances. It is an interesting study to see how many of these 15 enemies of a full life negatively impact circumstances and their solutions positively impact circumstances. As an example, we turn to the book of Esther. We heard a couple of the key passages, we will hear them again. I won't highlight every time an enemy or its opposite shows up, but hopefully I will try give you an idea when they do by my tone, or maybe I'll raise my hand or something, we'll see how it goes.

As the book opens, we see <u>fearful</u>, worried, <u>anxious</u> exiles living in Susa even though they had freedom to return over 50 years earlier. They had been there so long that they were already established – or they feared the journey, but either way they remained foreigners in the city of the Persian king's winter home.



It was here that the self-centered king with undisciplined desires king spent 6 months displaying his wealth and power and ego as they planned to attack Greece. In the midst of these meetings the king held a banquet, got drunk and wanted to show off his beautiful wife (Jewish tradition adds bare – ly, not clothed, just barely). But Queen Vashti was busy hosting a banquet for the women of the palace and refused to come. Now this angry, resentful, hateful king was just sober enough to follow protocols and asked his advisors what he should do about it. Long story short – she was deposed (Jewish tradition adds that she was executed) and in an act of ignorance and lack of judgment a decree was sent throughout the land that women shall respect their husbands; (they felt that if they left Vashti get away with it, then she would become an example and women all over the land would begin doing ---- something they didn't want them to do. Let's put it that way. And so they created a law that said they shall respect their husbands, as if a law would ever make that work (2). With Vashti gone, in a move reminiscent of the Cinderella ball designed to find the new princess – all the beautiful women were called from the harem where they were given beauty treatments and a chance to become the new queen.

Now Mordecai was one of the Susa exiles in those days. When his uncle and aunt died, in <u>outgoing love, total life discipline, and unselfishness</u>, he took his cousin Esther and raised her as his own daughter. She had been put into the king's harem and so was now a candidate to become queen. Mordecai used his <u>knowledge</u> to give her advice, and to not reveal her nationality. Even though Jews were free and could do business and even hold political office – they were still exiles (It would be like – "the slaves are free" but there are still a lot of civil rights biases to overcome in that foreign land. With <u>physical harmony and training</u>, Esther secured favor with the man in charge of the harem and he assigned seven maidens to work with her. Mordecai hung around the courtyard worrying about her. Unlike our instant make-over shows, this make-over was a 1-year required process, and the story goes into detail, but we won't take time to do that.

She followed the <u>knowledgeable</u> advice of the harem leader, and her time before the king won her the place of queen, giving her an opportunity to have an even wider impact on her <u>social order</u>. This is the point of the story where during a gathering of the harem, Mordecai overheard the plot and thus thwarted the assassination of King Xerxes, and when Esther told the king about it, she did mention that it was Mordecai who found out about I, so his name got into the records that way.

Then the king began to honor Haman above all other nobility, who along with everyone else, were to bow down to him. So, wherever Haman went people bowed, and it went to Haman's <u>self-centered</u> head.

But Mordecai, who had a <u>faith that went beyond himself and undivided loyalties</u> wouldn't bow down, because he was a Jew and he only bowed to his one God. This <u>enraged</u> Haman who decided he didn't just want to take out Mordecai, he was going to wipe Jews off the face of the whole Persian Empire, creating an <u>unfaithful social order</u>.

Haman used his status to convince the king that it was not in his best interest to tolerate the Jews' presence; and that he himself would pay for their execution. The king refused the money but in <u>ignorance and a lack of judgment</u>, (for the king was not fact checking, but only listening to the scheming Haman for his information to form his bias), and he allowed Haman to do as he pleased.

They tossed a pur, from which we get the word purim (which is kind of like drawing or lots (or throwing die) and it was to see when this genocide and transformation of the <u>social order</u> would take place – and the result of the toss was that it was nearly a year away. The law was written and delivered to every province. All the people who read it were shocked and confused, (just like sometimes in America), wondering why and how this law came to being -- while the king and Haman sat down to drink.

Mordecai, in <u>faith beyond self</u>, mourned in Jewish fashion, (torn clothes, sackcloth and ashes, weeping and wailing) which caught the attention of Esther's servants. They told her about it. In <u>positive outreaching love</u>, she sent him clothes, but he refused them. Then she sent a messenger to find out about why he was so upset. He explained the law and plan to exterminate the Jews; and Mordecai asked her to intercede. Even as queen, as we heard in the reading, Esther could not approach the king without him summoning her, and he had not summoned her for a long time, and if she went without a summons, she risked death, it was up to the fickleness of the king's mood of the day, and we already know from his dealings with Vashti that the king had an easily triggered explosive <u>anger and hate</u>. Needless to say, like most anyone would, Esther experienced <u>negativism and fear</u> as she explained her predicament through a servant who brought her message to Mordecai.

Mordecai warned her that she must <u>discipline</u> herself and <u>face her fears</u>. She cannot remain silent, for if she spoke up the Jews would still be delivered and maybe this was her calling! So Esther, in a <u>faith beyond herself that gives ultimate</u> <u>meaning and purpose</u>, she told Mordecai to have all the Jews fast for 3 days, and she and her maids would do the same. Then she went to see the king, who saw her and was pleased with her and offered her up to half of the kingdom. Instead, she invited the king and Haman to a banquet she had prepared. At the banquet, the king repeated his request: "Up to half the kingdom, what would you like?" Esther using all the <u>knowledge</u> she had gained, replied, "Come to a banquet tomorrow and then I'll give you an answer."

<u>Self-centered</u> Haman went out thrilled to be part of such an exclusive banquet, but then he saw Mordecai (who still wasn't bowing down to him) and he was again filled with <u>anger</u>, <u>resentment</u>, <u>and hate</u>, but he restrained himself for the moment. Instead, he went home, called all his friends together and started boasting about how much favor he had with the king, how rich he had become, and how Esther had invited he and the king to this exclusive banquet today and again tomorrow. But he still couldn't be happy with any of this because "that Mordecai" still wouldn't bow down to him.

In <u>self-serving ignorance and lack of judgment</u>, his friends, like the king, listened only to Haman's point of view, and in what MAY have been <u>self-serving insincerity</u>, advised him to build a 75-foot-high gallows and in the morning to ask the king to hang Mordecai on it, and then he could really enjoy his exclusive afternoon banquet. Haman loved the idea and had the gallows built.

Meanwhile, back in the palace that night, the king could not sleep. He began reading the annals (the historical records) and came across Mordecai's reporting the treason which had saved the king's life and noted that Mordecai had received nothing for this. So he began to ask his advisors "What are we going to do to reward this man, he saved my life..."

Just then, Haman arrived to ask about hanging Mordecai. The king sees his high ranking official and asks, "What should be done for the man the king delights to honor?" <u>Self-centered</u> Haman naturally thought, 'Who else could he be talking about except me?" So he answered, "Dress him in a royal robe that has been worn by the king. Put him on a horse the king has ridden, decorated with the royal crest, and let him be led through the streets by people who will proclaim, "This is what is done for the man in whom the king delights!"

So the king, in <u>resolving guilt</u> for not rewarding Mordecai in the past, said, "Good! Get the robe, get the horse, do everything as you have suggested, and go get Mordecai the Jew who sits at the king's gate, and you lead him through the town proclaiming to all 'This is what is done for the one who pleases the king.'" Haman did not like that, but he had no choice, and he followed the king's commands and did this for Mordecai, and when it was done, he rushed home in grief.

In <u>negativism and fear</u>, this time his friends said, "You are on a downward track now! You will not stand much longer." And as they were saying it, the messengers came to get Haman for the queen's second exclusive banquet.

The king again asked what he could do for Esther, and she named the coming disaster on her people. "If they were only being sold as slaves," she said, "then I would have kept quiet, for it is too little to bother the king about it, but since this is annihilation, I felt I must speak."

And now we have <u>hate, anger, fear and ignorance, and guilt</u>, at least, in this next plot development coming up. The king was enraged, "Who is doing this!?!" Esther

pointed to the only other person at the banquet, Haman. "It is this vile Haman." Haman became terrified. The king got up in a rage, left his wine and went out the garden to fume. Haman knew the king had already decided his fate, and so he went to beg Esther, who was reclining on a couch. He fell on the couch just as the king was returning and the king assumed he was molesting her. And that wasn't a good thing for Haman either. At the king's words, servants covered Haman's face, and one of them said, "You know what, Haman has a 75-foot gallows standing at his home." So the king said "Hang him on it." And when Haman was hung on the gallows that Haman had built for Mordecai, then the king became calm again.

Haman's estate was granted to Esther. Esther told the king about her relationship to Mordecai, her cousin, and so the king took the signet ring (the ring that grants you authority) that he had previously given to Haman and gave it to Mordecai.

Esther now used her influence to transform the <u>social order</u> by going to the king again asking for another favor, for the law of the coming genocide was still in effect. The king said write the laws as you see fit, and the edict went out that the Jews had the right to assemble and to protect themselves, and legally attack any armed forced that seeks to kill or plunder them (on that genocide day).

Mordecai left the king's presence in royal robes and the city had a great celebration of happiness and joy and gladness; with feasting and celebrating. Any many people became Jews because they feared the Jews. Go with the winner, right? (In my last church in the UP, it was "if the Lions were doing bad, vote for the Packers, for vice versa" because the teams were about the same distance away. Probably involved in that was <u>unconscious or conscious insincerity, self-centeredness, negativism and inferiority attitudes, divided loyalties</u>, a whole bunch of the enemies could have explained the motivation for why they became Jews, but one is actually listed in the Bible <u>fear, worry, anxiety</u>, for it says they were afraid of the Jews, and so they converted to Judaism to be safe.

When the time of the scheduled genocide of the Jews came, the destruction planned for them failed and flopped because everyone was afraid of them and Mordecai became even more prominent; second in command of the whole Persian Empire, only the king himself held a higher position. The tables of the <u>social order</u> were turned completely around. Mordecai recorded these events and sent them to the Jews everywhere, and the celebration of Purim was established.

So you see, in any "little" story (of the Bible), how many enemies of life, or their conquering opposites apply, and I could have listed more, even within this synopsis that I gave you. But it is to just give you an idea. If the king had just been wise in the beginning, if he had controlled his temper, if he mastered his urges, if Haman had been humble, the story would have had a completely different plot line. So many negative examples from which to learn, and good examples too.

How much this means for us today, to follow these principles, which is capped off by positive outgoing, (outflowing) love. In following them is how to have an abundant life.

A modern singing group asks this question (slightly paraphrased and lifting just a few of the lyrics):

What's wrong with the world? People acting like they have no parents? ... addicted to drama, attracted to things that'll bring trauma. If you only have love for your own, then you leave space to hate. Madness is [then] what you demonstrate and that's exactly how anger works and operates. You've got to take control of your mind and meditate. Let your soul gravitate -- to love [people]... People killing, people dying, children hurt and you hear them crying. Can you practice what you preach? Would you turn the other cheek? Father, help us, send some guidance from above, cause people got me questioning: Where is the love? People keep on giving in, making wrong decisions only envisioning the dividends, not respecting each other, denying our brother, If you never know the truth, then you never know love. Where is the love? portions of "Where is the Love?" by Black Eyed Peas

I think that is a good call to church. Love is in the salt and light and seeds of Christ's kingdom. We are charged to bring it to our world and to work towards a social order that reflects the positive outgoing love of God, just as he expressed it through the life and death and resurrection and Spirit of Jesus -- beginning right within each of our own hearts and then from there flowing outward....

Prayer Let's pray. God of power and wonder, we are awestruck by the glory of your presence, the way you work things out for your people as they worship and pray. We rejoice at what we see in Scripture, throughout history, and in our own lives. You continue to shine brightly in our world, loving, protecting, challenging and nurturing. As we wait on you, you lift us up, you strengthen and transform us. so that we may love and serve you in all that we do, and by doing so, bring glory to Christ in whose name we are praying. **Amen.**


